Book Club News and Reviews

June 2020 DC PBK Book Club Meeting:

On June 29, twelve members of the Book Club met on Zoom to discuss the incredibly timely selection *Chocolate City: A History of Race and Democracy in the Nation's Capital*, by Chris Myers Asch and Derek Musgrove. Though our selections for the Spring and Fall Series are finalized months in advance, this book could not have come into our lives at a more fitting time. We opened the discussion reflecting on which chapters best contextualized the current national conversation on equality and institutional racism. Starting in the colonial era, Asch and Musgrove paint a compelling portrait of a city at once founded in



inequality, and vaunted as a leader in progressive policy reforms. Readers from DC glean so much context for the streets they walk every day, tracing the impact of real estate markets, urban planning, education policy, political competition, and the overarching struggle for true Congressional representation as it evolves over time within each neighborhood. While this is a story of the DMV, and its spotlight as the nation's capital, it is simultaneously the story of so many U.S. cities where racial and socioeconomic disparities are starkly visible and fiercely contested. The book is a tour de force; its use of primary and secondary sources seamlessly elevates the narrative in a way few of our nonfiction selections have matched. Highly, highly recommended by the group to all DC PBK Association members!

July 2020 DC PBK Book Club Meeting:


The group met the following month on July 29 on Zoom to discuss the fiction selection *Children of Blood and Bone*, by Nigerian-American author Tomi Adeyemi. The group has read quite a few Young Adult selections over the years, and we enjoy discussing the level at which themes are communicated, and whether we think they're appropriate or communicated well to the audience. This particular book is entertaining it is sweeping in its use of magic, camaraderie and travels, and it successfully conveys the author's intentional parallels to modern re-



successfully conveys the author's intentional parallels to modern racism and systemic oppression. Members felt, knowing this was the author's first novel, that the dialogue and writing leave room for maturation in the subsequent books expected in the series, and that perhaps too many locations and characters were leveraged to effectively pace the narrative.

Mid-August 2020 Bonus DC PBK Book Club Meeting:

On August 13, the Book Club met for a bonus Zoom discussion of *The City We Became* by N. K. Jemisin. About four times a year, the group meets twice in a month, discussing selections that were popular choices during our voting cycle but didn't quite make the cut for our regular, end of month discussions. N. K. Jemisin is a celebrated science fiction author, and much beloved by many in DC PBK Book Club, so we were happy to dive into her latest novel. In this story, each borough of NYC



has a human avatar, who embodies the spirit and character of the place, and they must band together to fend of inter-dimensional villains. It is an incredibly novel concept, and it speaks to the global fascination with NYC that even those who don't live there can still easily visualize Jemisin's depiction of the city's people, values, and geography. Jemisin does clearly have political arguments embedded- close-minded, fearful, xenophoic Staten Island in particular is not portrayed favorably, juxtaposed to her vibrant, welcoming, talented fellow boroughs, and members may take issue with various characterizations. Science fiction is always welcome in our group- we have one more selection coming up this Fall by another celebrated female science fiction author, Ursula K LeGuin.

- October (Date TBD): *A Fisherman of the Inland Sea* by Ursula K LeGuin (Fiction, 207 pages)
 - Mid-October Bonus (Date TBD): The Heartbeat of Wounded Knee: Native America from 1890 to the Present by David Treur (Nonfiction, 526 pages)
- November (Date TBD): *Fictions* by Jorge Luis Borges (International, 179 pages (Argentina))
- December (Date TBD): *To Marry an English Lord* by Gail MacColl and Carol McD. Wallace (Nonfiction, 403 pages)

When members RSVP to our Book Club meetings online, the automated registration confirmation will contain the information needed to join the Zoom meeting online on the day. We look forward to the day where we can resume our in-person chats, but have had great success with breakout smaller groups in Zoom, and in some ways it's easier to hear, internalize, and socialize in this new format, so we welcome the interim change.
