4. Our <u>Treasurer</u> and newest board member, **Sarah Eckhardt**!





Book Club News and Reviews

January Meeting Recap

On January 31, thirteen members of the book club met to kick off our Spring 2024 series with the much-lauded International selection *Pachinko*, by Min Jin Lee. One group gathered at Teaism in Dupont, the other on Zoom. Sweeping, stirring, and full of history few of us had encountered in school or otherwise, we recommend this multigenerational story of a Korean community living in Japan over several decades. We agreed pacing in the last third felt off, but this could reflect the difficulty of sustaining reader investment in the trajectories of a multitude of characters. A glimpse into everyday lives of a displaced community swept up in the political, economic, and social upheaval of the 20th century, the novel is certainly difficult to read at several points, but generated deep conversation on character motivations, decisions made based on social expectations, national identity, and World War II history.





February Meeting Recap

On February 26th, five members met to discuss the unique nonfiction selection *Poison: The History of Potions, Powders, and Murderous Practitioners* by Ben Hubbard. The group appreciated sporadic excerpts explaining the chronological socio-cultural context of ingredients and criminal activity, but overall was disappointed by the writing, format, and history featured. We felt the book too heavily relied on sensationalism and imagery, rather than delivering an interesting analysis of the topic. One of the most fascinating shifts highlighted was the switch from broad availability of various substances to individuals with largely personal motives and targets, to 20th century regulation and government production and use of dangerous substances, for good and for ill.
