
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Book Club

June Meeting Recap

On Wednesday, June 26th, a group of six met to discuss the bestseller *Demon Copperhead* by Barbara Kingsolver. Universally we agreed on the quality of the writing but also how incredibly difficult the subject material is for any reader, but especially parents wishing to



provide the best for their child and shield them from hardship. Based on the classic Dickens novel *David Copperfield*, Kingsolver explores a childhood and beyond impacted by drug abuse, child abuse, extreme deficiencies in the foster care system, and much more. We spoke about the tone set by the novel's first person narration and reflection, themes of abandonment and predetermination vs agency in one's own life, and the main character's many influences over time.

Coffee & Conversation

It's almost here – <u>Coffee & Conversation</u> is back with another scintillating speaker! Join us for an interview with one of our own -- the woman who wrote the book on reporting, Maurine Beasley,

Ph.D., on Monday, July 22 6:30PM-7:30PM over Zoom!

Dr. Maurine H. Beasley is professor emerita at the Philip Merrill College of Journalism at the University of Maryland - College Park where she was a faculty member for four decades. A native of Sedalia, Missouri, she was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa at the University of Missouri Columbia where she received bachelors' degrees in journalism and history. She also holds a master's degree from the Columbia University School of Journalism and a Ph.D in American civilization from George



Washington University. At Maryland she was president of the College Park chapter of Phi Beta Kappa. The author, editor or co editor of some eight books and author of dozens of articles in academic publications, Dr. Beasley's scholarly interests center around the history of women in the Washington press corps including Eleanor Roosevelt, herself a journalist. Her book, *Women of the Washington Press*, won the national Kappa Tau Alpha prize for the best book on journalism history published in 2012. Her professional experience includes three years as education editor of the Kansas City Star and ten years as a reporter for The Washington Post. She is a past president of the Association for Education in Journalism and the American Journalism Historians Association and has won awards from both organizations as well as

from the Washington chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists of which she also is a past president.

Dr. Beasley will share with us her expertise in journalism, some observations of current trends, and the history of women's contributions to the field. Don't miss it!

Believe it or not, our next annual event is already around the corner! Join us at this year's Key Connections MentorMix Event Sunday, September 29 11:00AM-2:00PM at the Workhouse Arts Center. As always, Key Connections will support Phi Betes helping Phi Betes through networking at all career stages – from brand new inductees to veteran members. This year's event will be hosted on the picturesque campus of one of the most eclectic art galleries in the area, where guests will be surrounded by pieces from preeminent artists in a wide variety of media: painting, ceramics, glasswork, sculpture, textiles, and more...but that's not all!

For fans of dark history, the beautiful red brick architecture in the style of Thomas Jefferson belies, by design, the true purpose for which the structures were built. Originally a



penitentiary under the DC prison system, the workhouse was notoriously a place for would-be prisoners to work off their debt to society as an alternative to formal imprisonment. None other than the suffragettes were detained within these walls before they were sent off to their permanent prison quarters, and the grounds contain a small museum dedicated to the women's suffrage movement. Not until the early 2000s was the workhouse repurposed from a functioning prison to an arts gallery, as careful observers can glean from the guard's watchtower on

the lawn, still viewable from the main building.

This year's event will be a mashup of the annual Key Connections event with our MentorMix events offered through the Mentorship Network.
